The Cover Art

The O Antiphons have historically been prayed, one each day, at evening prayer beginning on December 17 in Advent. They also comprise the verses to the traditional Advent hymn, *O Come O Come Emmanuel*. The Antiphons use Old Testament, prophetic names for the Messiah, primarily from the book of Isaiah. They speak of the hope that has and is to come through Jesus, the Christ.

The initials of the Latin titles if listed backwards acrostically (Ero Cras) spell the promise of God, "Tomorrow, I will be there."

Several years ago, Mimi Heldman sketched a set of O Antiphons for St. B's. They are used as the bulletin cover art on Sundays during Advent. We sing the corresponding verse of the hymn, O Come O Come Emmanuel at the beginning of the service.

Finally, let us remember before God his pure and lowly Mother, and that whole multitude which no one can number, whose hope was in the Word made flesh, and with whom, in Jesus, we are one for evermore.

And now, to sum up all these petitions, let us pray in the words which Christ himself has taught us, saying:

hallowed be thy Name,
thy kingdom come,
thy will be done,
on earth as it is in heaven.
Give us this day our daily bread.
And forgive us our trespasses,
as we forgive those who trespass against us.
And lead us not into temptation,

Adam and Eve rebel against God and are cast out of the Garden of Eden

Now the serpent was more crafty than any other wild animal that the Lord God had made. He said to the woman, 'Did God say, "You shall not eat from any tree in the garden"?' The woman said to the serpent, 'We may eat of the fruit of the trees in the garden; but God said, "You shall not eat of the fruit of the tree that is in the middle of the garden, nor shall you touch it, or you shall die." 'But the serpent said to the woman, 'You will not die; for God knows that when you eat of it your eyes will be opened, and you will be like God, knowing good and evil.' 


The Angel Gabriel announces to the Virgin Mary that she will bear the Son of the Most High




Eucharistic Prayer B

We give thanks to you, O God, for the goodness and love which you have made known to us in creation; in the calling of Israel to be your people; in your Word spoken through the prophets; and above all in the Word made flesh, Jesus, your Son. For in these last days you sent him to be incarnate from the Virgin Mary, to be the Savior and Redeemer of the world. In him, you have delivered us from evil, and made us worthy to stand before you. In him, you have brought us out of error into truth, out of sin into righteousness, out of death into life.

On the night before he died for us, our Lord Jesus Christ took bread; and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, and said, "Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me."

We await his coming in glory;


And we offer our sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving to you, O Lord of all; presenting to you, from your creation, this bread and this wine.

The Breaking of the Bread

All persons baptized in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit are invited to receive the Body and Blood of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. At St. Bartholomew's, opportunity is given for communion in both "kinds" -- the Body and the Blood of Jesus -- by intinction. When it is your turn for Communion, please stand or kneel with your hands out in front of you, palms up and flat. The priest will dip a host (wafer) in the wine in the chalice and place it on your palm for you to consume. You may tell the priest that you would like to receive the host only. Gluten-free wafers are available; ask the priest who is serving you at the communion rail. Finally, if you simply wish to receive a blessing, please cross your arms over your chest when the priest approaches.

You are invited to pray the following words to make your Spiritual Communion at this time.


